
The information, handouts and historical and family research material was greatly received. The Kiwanis Club had in attendance ancestors of General Andrew Pickens and General Robert Anderson.

MINUTES OF 06 MAY 2013

The *Anderson County Chapter* of the *South Carolina Genealogical Society* met Monday evening, May 06, 2013, at Senior Solutions located in the Marketplace Square. There were a total of 29 members and 9 visitors present during this meeting.

President Harley Feltman called the meeting to order promptly at 7:00 pm and Chaplain Dr. Carl Ellison provided the invocation.

President Feltman then welcomed everyone present and conducted a very short business session, whereby Meeting Minutes of April 01, 2013, were rendered by the Recording Secretary and the Treasurer's Report for the month of April, 2013, was provided by Treasurer Joyce Fields. During her presentation she mentioned some of the mailing problems for the "Anderson Record" that Barbara Harris was resolving for the chapter. On a motion by Ex-Officio Member Bill Carlisle, seconded by Ruby Feltman, the reports were unanimously accepted.

Civil War Roundtable of Anderson County President Darlene Dowdy stated that Confederate Memorial Day in Anderson County would be observed by re-dedication of the 1902 Confederate Monument on Saturday, May 11, 2013, and a ceremony on Friday, May 10, 2013, at the grave of Major William Wirt Humphries, former Anderson Mayor, railroad executive, businessman and WBTS Veteran in the Old Silverbrook Cemetery.

President Feltman formally thanked both Shirley and Larry Phillips for their outstanding and successful efforts in providing refreshments at the conclusions of each meeting.

Program ChairPerson Kay Willis Burns introduced and welcomed HISTORIAN-PUBLISHER-ADVENTURER-CHEF Mr. Brian Scott for the evening's presentation regarding THREE of his active projects now in full operation: Historical Marker Data Bases (www.hmdb.org), A Documentation of the Old Silverbrook Cemetery and a Film History Video Series in conjunction with Dead Horse Productions, entitled "Under the Kudzu". (www.facebook.com/underthekudzu) To date, 57,938 historical markers are in place--33,375 from SC and 157 from Anderson County. Reading these markers is a concise and very interesting history of each chosen area. Mr. Scott's narrative concerning the Old Silverbrook Cemetery was sprinkled with fascinating historical accounts that held our interest throughout the presentation. To date, he has taken 14,000 photos of the cemetery with 5,100 indexed—beginning with the Sullivan Plot in the Evergreen Section. He stated that originally the area had a lake and was popular for picnics. The first recorded burial at OSB was 1879 for eighteen-month-old Ross H. Crayton in the Evergreen Section—although some headstones bear earlier dates, as those remains were re-interred from other cemeteries. The Potter's Field was opened in 1896 and Aeronaut Maude Broadwick, an early aereo-casualty was buried in OSB on November 03, 1905. Mr. Scott mentioned Anderson's first "public cemetery" was located at the First Presbyterian Church, final resting place for Anderson's earliest forefathers. He also mentioned the "Poor House Cemetery" which was located near the Recycling Center on Woodcrest Drive, also used for burial of deceased Stockade Prisoners during that era of operation.

Mr. Scott then presented two historically interesting and informative videos of the new "Under the Kudzu" video series examining their first two episodes: "Stoneman's Raiders" and "The Battle of Anderson," a resultant action of the Union efforts to capture Confederate President Jefferson Davis in his flight South after Appomattox.

In response to a question, "What interesting things have you learned in those endeavors":

- 1. When Anderson was occupied after the WBTS, it was not burned because of wine provided to occupying troops from a bar at Benson and Main Streets.
- 2. Of some of the unsavory characters buried in OSB, one of the Tolly brothers makes a very (Continued next Page)

interesting tale.

- 3. The first lady to graduate in Agriculture is buried in OSB.
- 4. He has learned to "read cemeteries", ie., obelisks were popular years ago and if one was cut off at the top, it meant that the person died young.
- 5. The husband of the Lady aeronaut hot-air balloon fatality, Charles Broadwick, later developed a parachute pack for use by the US military.
- 6. "Confederate Gold" was witnessed by Robert Pickens on its way South.
- 7. Only salvaged paper from the abandoned Confederate Treasury was recovered after looting by the Union Troops.
- 8. A park at River and Fant Streets was used to bivouac Union Troops during the occupation of Anderson—Manse Jolly's final ride from Anderson went through this park on his trusty steed "Dixie" and headed for Texas.
- 9. Recipe Books (not Cook Books) were available help for homemakers because more items than cooking were addressed.

President Feltman especially thanked Paul Kankula for his tremendous efforts in documenting many cemeteries in the Tri-County area and for the many websites he has generated and developed on behalf of genealogists and their organizations over the years. Mr. Kankula has provided a very valuable service with those efforts and we would not have had so many opportunities without what he has given us. Thank You, Mr. Kankula.

A lengthy Q&A session followed and the meeting was concluded with another excellent refreshment period.

MINUTES OF 03 JUNE 2013

The Anderson County Chapter of the South Carolina Genealogical Society met Monday, June 03, 2013, at Senior Solutions located in the Marketplace Square. There were a total of 34 members and 2 visitors present. Ex-Officio Past President, Rev. Robert Carlisle called the meeting to order promptly at 7:00 pm and Chaplain, Dr. Carl Ellison provided the invocation.

Reverend Carlisle then welcomed all members and guests present and in the absence of both a Treasurer's Report and Meeting Minutes for May, the business session was postponed. Membership/State Representative, Shelby Lollis reminded everyone of the upcoming State meeting in Columbia, SC and the need for completing and submitting the *Surname Directory Project* and the *Family Pedigree Charts*. Editor, Barbara Harris urged all members to submit information for upcoming newsletter articles for our publication, *The Anderson Record*. Chaplain, Dr. Carl Ellison stated that revision of his CD's would be completed by next Tuesday. Program Chairperson, Kay Willis Burns reminded everyone that although no meeting would be conducted in July, a brunch is scheduled July 20 at the Bleckley Inn, with Ms. Jan Alpert, Past President of the *National Genealogical Society* presenting "Discover How Your Grandparents Met, and Unlock New Clues such as Finding Maiden Names."

Program Chairperson, Kay Willis Burns provided one of her patented personal introductions for the speaker of the evening—Jack F. McIntosh, Attorney, Historian and self-professed *Geeche*, or one who speaks the Gullah language. Mr. McIntosh is an expert and extremely eloquent in the Gullah language and revealed subtly that he had to attend Furman University to learn the English language, being originally from Charleston, SC. He virtually brought the Gullah language pleasantly to life while speaking from his heart, Gullah being a creolized form of English containing many words and grammatical features derived from several African languages. Mr. McIntosh began the historical background journey along the Ivory Coast of Africa then traveled to South and Central America. Plantations were moved, he stated, lock, stock and barrel to South Carolina where people gathered after the work day to pass on stories and as a means of communication. He gave several specific examples of conversational Gullah and conducted extensive readings in Gullah from both Aesop's Fables and The Gospel of St. Luke—the Christmas Story was presented as very few of us have ever heard it. He discussed Mr. Ambrose Gonzales, a writer of SC planter-class background, who wrote original stories in 19th century Gullah based on Gullah literary forms—such as Aesop's Fables. After several examples of hilarious Gullah language anecdotes, Mr. McIntosh held an extensive Q & A session, complimenting Ms. Kathryn Smith, a local free-lance writer, for her assistance, and briefly mentioning his second book, "Riding a Chicken," his story of a "mainstream American" coping in today's day and time.

A very outstanding refreshment and fellowship period followed and was enjoyed by all.

DOWSING FOR GRAVES

In a Dec. 5, 1998, email from "Betteye" bbolden@tir.com, Sender: owner-afrigeneas@Lists.MsState.Edu, to an unnamed recipient at Mississippi State, the following was reported to have been taken from http://www.usigs.org/signal/98-12-1.htm#dowse.

He is not, he insists, a graveyard ghoul or an occultist. Yet this retired pharmacist in Jackson, Miss., admits to an uncanny ability to find ancient gravesites. Not only to find them, but to determine which way the body lies, and whether it is male or female.

Robert (Bob) Grantham -

RNGrantham@Prodigy.net - has found a method that has eluded scientists and technical experts of various disciplines, who require vast sums of money and tons of equipment to do the same thing with far less success for developers wanting to build over old cemeteries, governments wanting to flood lands with new lakes and families just wanting to find out where Grandpa lies.

Grantham is the first to admit that he has no idea why his simple tools - dowsing rods - work. He has tried to find out, he says, but without success. He just knows that two metal rods coated with wax, or even a metal coat hanger in a pinch, can locate graves.

Time and time again he has proved it. He no longer tries to explain the phenomenon. "Many feel that one must believe that they will work," he says. "Keep in mind that they won't work for everyone," he cautions.

But for him, they will locate suicide and murder victims, persons of different lifestyles and races and ages and even animals. And, oh yeah, just like the water witching devices, they will locate water as well.

He used two 36-inch sections of steel welding rod, 3/32 of an inch in diameter (0.0937") which can be obtained from any welding shop. Clothes line or a straightened clothes hanger will work, but it must be made of steel. At one end he bends a six-inch handle at a 90-degree angle.

Here's how he does it. He holds one wire in each hand with the long portion protruding in front. He bends his elbows at a 90-degree angle. Away from his body, his forearms are straight out in front. Both arms and rods are parallel to the ground, and the rods are parallel to each other.

Most cemeteries, he notes, bury a body with head to the west and feet to the east - but some do not.

He approaches a suspected grave site at about midpoint, shuffling very slowly. ("Pick a day with little or no wind," he advises.) As he moves over the body, the two wires will cross. Now he backs up and approaches a little to one side - if he is still over the body the wires will cross. Slowly he outlines the length of the body - "As you cross over, one rod will go straight ahead and the other will point toward the body," he says. If he is very careful, he can determine actual length within two or three inches.

He keeps a pocketful of red, white and blue poker chips, and drops a white one at

each marked point. Marbles or any other small object may be used as a marker.

Now, extending only one wire or rod overhead, he walks slowly toward the midpoint. The rod will slowly turn clockwise if a woman is buried below, or counterclockwise for a male.

Again, he starts at midpoint, holding one wire only straight from his body, about waist high. It will turn toward the head of a female, or the feet of a male, he claims. Now he drops a red poker chip at the lady's head, a blue one at the head of a man.

He makes careful measurements and makes proper notations. He may use a couple of small stakes for more permanent marker.

He first heard of these dowsers a few years ago from a cousin in Fox River Grove, Ill. Linda Grantham Stengele, he claims, has become so adept in the dowser use, with such dependable accuracy, that the local courts have accepted her findings in deciding whether to permit a developer to build over possible gravesites. Some companies have spent up to \$700 per potential gravesite to determine the same thing, and the length of time to take soil samples, core samples, examine old records, and go through all the other procedures can be expensive as well.

Grantham has found several hundred graves to date, the oldest being about 175 years old. One of his most notable successes came in an old Catholic cemetery, St. Michaels's in Pensacola, Fla., with a TV camera aimed at him. Church officials claimed that their records were accurate, but he found several "empty" graves without a body, and he

found several bodies lying several feet away from the marked gravesite.

People have told him that the dowsers will not work with a suicide or a murder victim or an animal, but he has proved them wrong also in the field. Grantham, who filled prescriptions for more than 50 years, has inquired many times into the Why of the dowser, and still has no answer. It does not work on the principle of magnetism, despite using steel. "No more than the old water witcher's green willow forked stick worked on magnetism" he says.

He asked his son, a nuclear physicist/engineer for an explanation. He checked with other scientists and could offer no good reason. Grantham also asked a nephew, a noted geologist who found ten pages in a Geophysics publication outlining a procedure which locates lost graves with complicated electronic equipment and knowledgeable operators. Grantham was pleased to note that most of the methods recommended were deemed highly inaccurate as well as expensive. "And so it remains for us amateurs, with a couple of metal rods or bent coat hangers, to find Grandpa's grave," he says.

And if you are a believer, and if you are careful, and if you follow Grantham's directions, you just might succeed.

[If you know whom within your family or friends are likely candidates to accept these materials, please add the following point: "I suggest that the persons contacted regarding the assumption of the custody of these items include but not be limited to" and then list the names of those individuals at this point, with their addresses and telephone numbers if known.]




DID YOU KNOW?


